Senior Impact Spotlight

Ms. Lottie is a local senior whose husband of 60 years passed away in 2021. She was devastated. Her children saw how the loss of their father was affecting their mother's emotional state and they were very concerned about her living alone. They asked her to consider moving to an assisted living facility, but Ms. Lottie was adamant that she stay in the home she had shared with her husband. The family and Ms. Lottie worked with an Elder Care case manager to create plans that allowed everyone to feel safe without her moving from her home.

Ms. Lottie is visited by Meals on Wheels volunteers every Monday- Friday when they bring her a hot meal. With health and mobility issues, she is no longer able to stand for long periods to cook. These hot meals provide the healthy food that she previously enjoyed cooking, but now is unable to prepare. During the meal delivery, the volunteers are able to talk with her about how she is feeling and provide her with social engagement. She loves having someone to talk with each day!

In addition to the socialization, Meals on Wheels is a daily check to ensure she is safe in her home. Elder Care also assisted in securing an Emergency Alert Response system for her to use in a crisis. With this safety check and alert button, her children are comforted. They expressed how grateful they are for the support and the reassurance that their mother would not be alone and unsafe.

Ms. Lottie has also been receiving counseling through the program to help her deal with the loss of her husband.

With these vital supports, she is thriving at home. Her children called her case manager to compliment the services. They love that when they call and talk with her now, she sounds happy and is learning to enjoy her new life in a safe environment.

Financial Stewardship



Elder Care Services is able to keep our professional standards high and provide quality care to seniors due to our vigorous grant pursuits, generous donors, and wonderful volunteers. In 2021, we operated with reduced revenue due to COVID closures and restrictions at our center-based care site. With the financial diligence of past years, we were able to cover expenses without a reduction in our essential services, including Meals on Wheels and in-home care. In 2021, we also received \$70,209 of in-kind revenue to support our mission.



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Elder Care Services Programs



Nutrition Services

Meals on Wheels (hot & frozen) are delivered on weekdays to home-bound seniors and to our eight congregate meal sites.



Elder Day Stay

Day center that provides services to adults requiring continuous care as well as respite for caregivers, Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.



AmeriCorps Seniors

Seniors 55 years of age or older are placed in vital volunteer roles that enrich the quality of life for the senior and make lasting impacts to their community.



In-Home Services

In-home care for frail, functionally impaired, and homebound seniors as an alternative to nursing home placement.



Senior Outreach Services (S.O.S.)

Senior Outreach Services is the first contact for seniors seeking help and may provide material aid in addition to answering questions and connecting seniors to appropriate resources.
